Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA)

FFPSA

- Federal Act signed into law on February 9, 2018
- Makes significant changes to many aspects of the child welfare system to obtain federal IV-E funding
- The effective date for implementation of FFPSA in Wisconsin is October of 2021
- 2 components to the funding restructure:
 - Reduction in federal funding for placements of youth in group care settings
 - New funds available for evidence-based practices targeted to candidates for foster care



Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA)

- Reduce congregate care
- Prevent OHC placements





Role of Access/Initial Assessment


- Access
 - Receive CPS and child welfare calls from community when suspicion of abuse/neglect/unsafe child
 - Determine screen in/out
 - Access may refer caller/family to community resources if screened out
- Initial Assessment
 - Initial Assessment conducts assessment for screened in reports
 - Initial Assessment makes safety and substantiation decision
 - Initial Assessment may refer family to community resources.



Calls to Child Protective Services (CPS) Underlying Assumptions

- We all want children to be safe in their family homes
- We only want to intervene in families lives when necessary
- We want children and families to receive needed resources and services
- Well intentioned people in community
- We assume positive intent

eWiSACWIS Data April 2024 (#s are approximate)

- Calls made to DMCPS: 1,995 (not including after-hours)
- Total CPS referrals: 1,449
- CPS referrals screened in: 556 (378 of 556 for Neglect)
- Percentage of referrals screened in/out: 38%/62%
- Percentage of referrals substantiated: 8%
- Percentage of referrals opened for Ongoing services: 8%
- Percentage of referrals opened for In-home or non-cps services: 1%
- Percentage of referrals closed at IA: 89%
- Action taken on very small percentage of screened in referrals.



Prevention Efforts at DMCPS Access

- Quality Assurance reviews/decision making rationale
- Asking the next questions
- Is there opportunity for mandated reporter to help families that may not require CPS intervention
- Team decision making
- Screen in rate 47-50 percent in 2022
- Screen in rate 39-42 percent 2023-present
- Still a lot of work to do
- Goal is to reduce screen in rate, connect more families to community resources, and avoid CPS



DMCPS Prevention Efforts

- Stronger Families-utilizes a combination of case management services and peer advocates to assist families in finding local supports that fit their needs and help them thrive in-home.
- Milwaukee Family Intervention Services-replaced FISS
- Collaborating with county to connect to county base services



Prevention Efforts in Community

- Introducing to community our prevention efforts and remessaging when to make a call.
- Mandated reporter concern v. suspicion
- Child safety as a shared responsibility
- Strengthening relationships with community resources, (Ex. Safe Families, Cultural Brokers, 211, etc)
- Collaboration with Casey Foundation



Prevention Work/Research

- Focus on neglect referrals
 - -55-60 Percent of referrals are for neglect
- Evaluated our referral sources
 - -Law enforcement and schools refer most
- Reviewed breakdown of zip codes to determine highest referral areas
 -(53208, 53209, 53215)



Casey Foundation/Mapping

- Casey has been helping DMCPS with heat mapping
- Learning about preventative work being done in other jurisdictions




Count of children reported (duplicate; screen in/out)
