Section 1: Report of 2021 Activities

1. Please describe the panel's 2021 meeting schedule, including the frequency and type of panel meetings, and the frequency and type of any subcommittee and workgroup meetings.

The Milwaukee Child Welfare Partnership Council (MCWPC) conducted quarterly public meetings in 2021. There were meetings on 3/26/2021, 6/11/2021, 9/24/2021, and 11/12/2021. The MCWPC currently has three subcommittees which met in 2021. The Critical Incident Committee met three times on 1/19/2021, 5/26/2021 and 9/8/2021; the 9/8/2021 meeting was a closed meeting so that case reviews could be completed. The Out-of-Home Care Committee met five times on 1/7/2021, 2/4/2021, 5/6/2021, 8/5/2021, and 10/7/2021. The Health and Education Committee met once on 9/16/2021.

2. Please describe how the panel provided for public outreach and comment in order to assess the impact of current procedures and practices upon children and families in the community.

The MCWPC conducted the majority of its 2021 meetings in a public forum to allow for community participation. The MCWPC has one closed session meeting in 2021. The MCWPC complied with all open meetings laws. This included posting information about the meetings and materials on the DCF and DOA websites in advance of the meetings, publishing the meeting notice in the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel, sending the meeting notice to the Madison State Journal, and posting the agenda at the Division of Milwaukee Child Protective Services (DMCPS) building located at 635 N. 26th St. Milwaukee WI 53233. Additionally, email invitations for the meeting were sent to an email mailing list of community members who have requested to receive notice of the MCWPC meetings. During each open meeting, time was left on the agenda for community input where community members could voice questions or concerns that would then be addressed by the council.

3. Please describe any case reviews conducted by the panel in 2021.

The Critical Incident Committee completed two case reviews on September 8, 2021. The Critical Incident Committee chose to only review cases that had been through the System Change Review Case Mapping Process completed by the Bureau of Safety and Well-Being (BSWB) within the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families (DCF).

4. Please summarize any other panel activities or panel events that took place in 2021.

The MCWPC continued to monitor DMCPS progress on the Jeanine B. Settlement Agreement and receive updates regarding exiting the Settlement Agreement. The progress was viewed at the 3/24/2021, 6/11/2021, and 9/24/2021 meetings. DMCPS was released from the Jeanine B. Settlement Agreement on 9/29/2021, but the MCWPC will continue to monitor the performance of DMCPS. The MCWPC received presentations on the DCF Budget, the Family First Prevention Services Act, "The Centrality of Housing: What do we know? How can we integrate what we know?" The MCWPC appointed a new chairperson, Christine Holmes, who was previously a Council member. The MCWPC had 2 new members appointed, Representative David Bowen and Santana Lee. The MCWPC had 2 members leave the Council, including Dr. Michelle Bria whose term as Chairperson ended and Mark Mertens who chose to resign. The MCWPC currently has two Wisconsin Resident vacancies.

The MCWPC has expressed an interest in learning about the sex trafficking prevention efforts that are occurring in Milwaukee County and in which DMCPS is involved. These prevention efforts include ongoing collaboration with local law enforcement. It is anticipated that a presentation regarding this subject will be completed during the November 2022 meeting of the MCWPC. The MCWPC has been receiving regular updates from DMCPS regarding the ongoing efforts to implement the Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA). It is anticipated during each meeting in 2022, time will be dedicated for DMCPS to provide FFPSA updates to MCWPC.

Other Anticipated Efforts and Activities in 2022 (Not related to chosen CPS

It is anticipated that the MCWPC will continue to receive updates regarding DMCPS performance as DMCPS moves past reporting on performance in relation to the Jeanine B. Settlement presentations and on overall DMCPS child welfare outcomes and performance. Additionally, it is expected that information on programs such as Wendy's Wonderful Kids, will be provided to the council.
