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**Subject:** NMHM & BMHM – Outreach & Resources

April is <u>National Minority Health Month</u> (NMHM), a time to raise awareness and address health disparities affecting racial and ethnic minority groups across the United States.

This past week marked the fifth year anniversary of <u>Black Maternal Health Week</u> (BMHW), founded by the <u>Black Mama's Matter Alliance</u>! BMHW is purposefully situated during NMHM to deepen the conversation about Black maternal health in the United States.

In Wisconsin, the <u>maternal mortality disparity</u> between Black women and non-Hispanic white women is higher than the national average. The <u>infant mortality disparity</u> between Black newborns and non-Hispanic white newborns is also one of the highest in the nation. Due to these <u>stark racial disparities</u> and the impact of the social determinants of health, it is important to make sure women who are pregnant, and especially those with at-risk pregnancies, are informed of the W-2 services available to them.

Beyond W-2 services, the <u>Woman, Infants, and Children</u> (WIC) program is also available to eligible women who are pregnant, breastfeeding, postpartum, or have an infant or children under 5 years old. WIC is a DHS assistance program that provides supplemental foods, breast feeding and nutrition education, and referrals to doctors, dentists, and other public assistance programs.
